# Pastoral Update - Half term 2 2024-25

Dear Parents/Carers,

Here is our second installment of all things pastoral. Just like in our half term 1, we have lots of exciting news and information to share with you. As it is nearly Christmas, perhaps a mince pie or another sweet treat could be enjoyed whilst you read through this half term's student achievements and key notices for January. We would like to inform parents/carers of students in Year 10 that Mrs Jackson is now officially our Senior Pastoral Manager for this year group. Many parents/carers have already expressed how much of a positive impact she has had on the year group. We would like to thank Mr. Wilding for his service and wish him all the best.

### Assemblies and Tutor Time Activities

Last week, Mrs. Darbyshire - our Trust Vice Principal - presented an assembly which focussed on supporting those who are less fortunate than ourselves. Over the last two weeks, we raised awareness and appealed for donations to support our local community. Students were asked to bring items of food to donate to our Christmas Hamper Appeal and Middlesbrough Foodbank. These included basic food items such as tins, bars of chocolate, packets of pasta, Christmas treats or Christmas gifts - we had an absolutely amazing response - thank you all so much for your generosity.



Following this appeal, we also raised awareness of child poverty by hosting our Christmas Jumper Day to raise funds for Save the Children. We invited students to participate in this event on the same day we enjoyed our Christmas lunch.







### 'In It to Win It' Attendance Draws

Mr. Yale and Mrs. Hodgson have recently completed assemblies based on the importance of attendance, particularly in the last week of the school term before we break up for Christmas. They outlined the need for good attendance, how it can improve your life chances, boost your morale and is something that is in your own control. 96% attendance is the target that all students are to aim for in their academic life at Nunthorpe, and so to improve this, the academy launched 'In It to Win It' draws, which took place during tutor time in the last week of the term. Students were entered into three draws for different attendance criteria. These included 100% attendance for the year to date, 96% attendance since the beginning of the year and 100% attendance for the final week. Prizes included £20 shopping vouchers and various selection boxes and treats. Everyone who was entered into the draw had therefore been 'In It to Win It' and was a huge success for all involved. We hope to introduce this again in the new year and make it a routine competition for our fantastic students.

### Well-being activities

Sixth formers have seen two wonderful wellbeing weeks with activities including dodgeball, crafts, game shows and table tennis to name a few. Students have all been involved and are thoroughly enjoying their chosen activities!

In the main school students have also been involved in reading for pleasure, competing in whole year group quizzes and understanding the importance of kindness; during assemblies, the theme of kindness was linked to the well-being of others and supporting those people in our community who may need a little extra help and kindness at this time if year; as mentioned above, students contributed towards the Christmas Hamper Appeal and the local Food Bank and were amazing in their generosity. Hot Chocolate with the Head has also continued to be a really busy event with many students being nominated by their teachers for excellent effort, enthusiasm and attitude - well done!



# Be here be on time and be the best you can be Attendance

Raising attendance is a national focus for the Department for Education. As a trust, and at our school, we follow and promote all the national statutory requirements and guidance. All students should aim to have at least **96% attendance**. Maintaining positive attendance enables students to fulfill their potential academically and are statistically more likely to be happy and become involved in the wider life of the school.

Whilst we appreciate that anyone can occasionally be too poorly to attend, it is essential that students maximise time in school. Please support us in encouraging your child to attend school everyday, to be on time and to be fully prepared with everything they need for the day in their bag. We keep students updated of their attendance each Monday along with our standards checks.

If your child is absent from school, please contact school on the first day of absence and every day afterwards until they return.

We reward positive attendance weekly, students who have 100% attendance each week are in our Freddo Friday and voucher draws and receive ambition points for excellent attendance. We also host our In it to Win it Drive each half term as detailed above.

### Behaviour

Since September, we have had a huge focus on promoting our core value of Respect, in particular, rewarding all our students for fulfilling our expectations and for going above and beyond. We are

delighted that the total amount of ambition points our students have achieved is a whopping 943,685! This is a fantastic achievement! 156 students have been nominated for Hot Chocolate with the head.

## Governor's Celebration Evening

In the concluding week of term, we celebrated the fantastic achievements of our brilliant students. The annual Governor's Commendation Evening recognises a student from each subject area and presents them with a 'Rising Star Award', along with fifty achievement points. Students are nominated by their subject teachers for reasons which can vary from exceeding expectations in a recent examination, going the 'extra mile' amongst others. The whole of the evening was a pleasure to be a part of and provided all involved with a great sense of pride to be part of such a wonderful community. In terms of entertainment, the audience were treated to several performances from our annual 'Nunthorpe's Got Talent' evening; enjoying Irish dancing, an original piano score and several renditions of popular songs. We can't wait to see what talent is presented to us all next year when we are able to repeat the success of this year's event.



As mentioned in our Half Term 1 Pastoral Letter in October, we are very proud of our school uniform and the rationale for maintaining high standards. We conduct standards checks each morning and during tutor time. In addition to this, we have introduced a formal quality assurance cycle once a half term during tutor time to see if we have any common themes which we need to address or support with. May we politely remind you that from Monday 6 January 2025 that students have removed any false eyelashes or nails, that skirts and trousers meet our <u>uniform policy</u>:

- Trousers must be dark grey. High fashion items are not permitted, e.g. jeans, denims, cords, bootlegs, hipsters, combats, pinstripes, skinny fit. No dangling or coloured belts, motifs, splits, zips (except fly).
- Skirts must be at knee length (i.e. the student should be able to kneel down and the skirt should touch the floor) and dark grey. No high fashion items e.g. stretch material, mini, ankle length, leather, suede, combat, etc. On straight skirts only one slit is permitted. No dangling or coloured belts, motifs, obvious pockets, large splits. Skirts should NEVER be worn rolled up at the waistband.
- Students should also ensure they have all of their equipment they need for the day in their bag.

As well as rewarding students throughout our weekly incentives, we reward our students through arranging excursions for students who maintain positive attendance and behaviour records. This term's trip to the Metrocentre was again a huge success, with 328 students and 26 staff enjoying a well earned shopping trip on Friday 29 November. It was lovely to see the students who get it right every day being rewarded with some social time - there was a lot of shopping but possibly even more eating and drinking!

## **SMSC**

Arrangements for our Headstarters Programme have now been finalised and the sessions will begin on Monday 13 January on Monday afternoons. The Headstarters programme aims to promote wellbeing and build resilience amongst young people. Our students will be trained as 'Headstarters' to offer support to others within our academy community. Appointment of our extended student leader programme

We have had our initial meeting with the new student leaders and they are excited to get started with their first charity and community projects, as well as looking ahead to supporting the Year 6 transition. ## School Council and Anti-bullying group

The new student-friendly version of the anti-bullying policy was presented by some of our anti-bullying ambassadors at a governors' meeting in December We were delighted that this was then subsequently ratified by the governors. The aim of this ongoing piece of work was to make the policy more student-friendly and to make very clear what would happen at each stage of an ongoing friendship, conflict or bullying issue. This was also presented to students in special assemblies for anti-bullying week in November; the students from Years 7 to 11 who planned and delivered these assemblies were so articulate, confident and organised that the assemblies went without a hitch and delivered strong messages on the theme of "Choose Respect".

December has seen our focus shift to our charity appeals, starting with the CAUSE Christmas hamper campaign, raising money for Children in Need and donations for Middlesbrough Foodbank. We are delighted to have achieved our target of 12 Christmas hampers for local families and we are very grateful to everyone who supported our appeal.

Our focus in January as a year group is ensuring that homework is handed in on time and improving punctuality on a morning and to lessons. Please consider how you can support this; students should be accessing Google classroom and Class Charts for the most up to date information.

Class Charts engagement from Year 7 is outstanding - please remember this is our main form of communication and support from home is greatly appreciated. Should you have any queries,

When we return in January, please maintain the high standards we have been seeing throughout the first term. ## Year 12

Year 12 have had a wonderful start to sixth form life. After a full term students are still maintaining 97% attendance with Mr. Yales tutor group maintaining 99%.

Year 12 students have made an extremely positive start and are eagerly getting involved with sixth form events including our ambassadors group. They have been supporting Year 11 marketplace events, starting a newspaper, organising end of term activities and fundraising including raising awareness and funds towards men's mental health and Children In Need. They also supported subject staff during our Sixth Form Open Evening. We have been completing personal statements and UCAS applications and have already sent off 33 applications with many students completing interviews already. Students are setting themselves up for a range of universities including Oxford, Russell group universities and Durham university to name a few. We have had a range of external providers coming in to provide information, advice and guidance to Year 13 students from a range of universities, apprenticeships and workplaces as well as alumni students to inform of their experiences.

Mentoring has started to take place with Year 13 students identified for support. Students have worked well with the sixth form leadership team and are eager to dedicate themselves to making further progress.

Year 13 are often seen staying back after college in order to be independent and revise. Both as a team and individually, they are working on their subjects prior to their mock exams. Year 13 mock exams are starting in January. Students are to return on Monday 6 January, Tuesday 7 January and then are taking a one day study leave day on Wednesday 8 January. Letters have been sent to parents/carers.

Year 12 and Year 13 have enjoyed an end of term award ceremony for their progress since September. Subject staff nominated students for a number of reasons including attitude to learning, progress and attainment. They all received a certificate and a chocolate bar. All award winners were put in a `spin the wheel` and an overall winner received an Amazon voucher.



### Literacy
